




OGLEBAY POOL

Cruspin Centers OSLEBAY POOL APINE ROOM

The original pool and building opened in 1938. While the park has maintained and improved the area over the years, significant investments transformed the outdoor pool by replacing a shallow baby pool with the Fountains of Fun Splash and Spray in 2016. The pool is now heated, and includes large inflatables, added in 2017. We've enhanced the refreshment stand menu, extended our hours, and added live music and themed nights in 2018 and 2019. Comparing attendance and revenue from 2015 to 2019, the pool's business is now 4 times larger, with revenue increasing by 357% because of these strategic investments.

In addition to pool improvements, the historic building has not been forgotten. With its large Palladian style windows, the stone building with slate roof, adjacent to Oglebay's pool is one of the most popular buildings in the park.









Investing in the Crispin Center has been a real labor of love.

THE ENTIRE COMPLEX IS CALLED the Crispin Center. It includes the Tennis Pavilion and courts, the aforementioned pool, grill room, and the Crispin Golf Course; locals call it the Pine Room. Designed by architect Fred Farris to "blend entirely with the ruggedness of the natural surroundings," it features sandstone that was quarried off nearby Peters Run Road by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the late 30s.

In 2019 a celebration pergola and patio was added to provide expanded event space with indoor/outdoor flexibility. The simple, versatile rooms are finished with natural pine paneling. They have magnificent windows, soaring stone fireplaces, and high beamed ceilings. These architectural details create a beautiful setting that has been used to great effect for dances, dinners, fund raisers, and weddings.

It comes as no surprise that weddings are big business. Approximately one-third of the weddings at Oglebay happen in the Pine Room. From 2018 to 2020 the number of weddings increased dramatically. Oglebay's vice president of sales and marketing Herb Faulkenberry attributes the increase, "to having a great product for our team to sell. They've done a tremendous job promoting Oglebay as a destination with first class facilities."


THE HESS FAMILY HAS DONE MORE to preserve and improve this building than anyone. During their lifetimes, siblings Chris and Mary Ann adopted the building, making several, significant gifts to honor their parents, Andrew and Margaret. The Hess' investment renewed the building's entire infrastructure, restored the interior paneling, improved the HVAC, and made the building ADA compliant and accessible with new main floor restrooms and a ramp.

When interviewed about a donation in the late 90s, Mary Ann shared that Oglebay Park was the center of her parents' social life. "They loved all the activities, especially the dances at the Pine Room."

Today both the Hess Family Foundation and the Chris Hess Foundation continue to give generously to the Oglebay Foundation. Without their ongoing investment in the park, the sustainable growth in our business could be compromised.

This year, the Chris Hess Foundation provided funds to repair and refurbish the original slate roof and flashings as well as the building's rain gutters and downspouts. Funds also covered re-pointing the chimneys and replacing two of the original roof top heating and cooling units.

All of these investments ensure that the activities available at the Crispin Center - swimming, golf, tennis, saying "I do," will remain, all for the love of Oglebay.



Onena Lake AREAIMPROVEMENTS

With its picturesque vistas, mature trees and naturalistic landscaping, it feels like Schenk Lake has always been here. In fact, the manmade lake was built in 1953, thanks to a generous gift from Albert Schenk III, to honor his parents. The Schenk family added the boathouse in 1955.

Kayaking, pedal boats, fishing, and in 2020 the first Polar Plunge, a new Oglebay tradition, are the activities associated with the water; there's also mini golf, an aerial challenge course, hiking trails, Segways, and the best hillside view of fireworks in the park.


Oglebay is investing in new pedal boats and other improvements designed to make the Schenk Lake area a larger family entertainment destination.

"We're excited about all the new features, the boats and furniture, but the path repairs and additional landscaping are really upping the charm factor. These investments will give families more opportunities to enjoy the park," says Oglebay Foundation President & CEO Eriks Janelsins.

Taking inspiration from Boston's Public Garden, swan boats are being introduced. Oglebay Institute Director of Museums Christin Byrum remarked "I love the swan boat addition. They played a big role in the early parks and recreation movement that swept the nation at the turn of the 20th century; very much of the Oglebay's era."

The boathouse will also be updated. Reconfiguring and updating the refreshment stand updating the sound system and adding festoon lighting so guests and visitors can enjoy the lake into the evening hours.

Schenk Lake may be manmade, but it's a natural place for the continuous river of visitors who gather together in appreciation of the beauty and majesty of Oglebay.

Activity wrist bands are a much more affordable way to enjoy everything Oglebay has to offer. At \$18.95 plus taxes, the wrist band provides admission to: the Oglebay Pool and Fountains of Fun Splash and Spray; the Good Zoo and train; both the Oglebay Institute's Mansion Museum and Glass Museum; all the activities at Schenk Lake including mini golf, pedal boats, and fishing; tennis; and par-three golf. Additional benefits in 2020 include the aerial challenge course and mountain bike rentals. A wrist band saves more than \$60.00 when purchasing activities a la carte!

Morgan and Jackie were OVAC champions at The Linsly School. "The girls really enjoyed playing together at Linsly," said Laurie. Morgan went on to play successfully at Wittenberg University and Jackie at Oberlin College.

The sport took the family all over the country and to several international destinations. "We've had so much fun playing at other facilities around the country and world. Oglebay's tennis facilities rank right up there with some of the finest facilities that we have seen anywhere. The courts are in beautiful shape, but as an older facility some enhancements are needed to keep it in a competitive condition," Greg added.

Greg was named a Wheeling Park Commissioner in 2018. Not long after his appointment to the commission he walked the tennis facility with Rod Haley, Oglebay's executive vice president of operations and Eriks Janelsins, Oglebay Foundation president & CEO. Together they made a wish list of possible improvements. "Laurie and I want to make sure the Ohio Valley tennis community remains strong with first rate facilities. Whenever I've played in our USTA league matches at Oglebay the players and spectators would congregate on the grassy area by courts seven - eleven. I've always thought it would be a great place for

a shelter that people would use and enjoy," said Greg.

The McDermott Family Tennis Shelter will open in 2020. "We're not just enthused about the shelter, but also the alternative racket facilities that are being added including new platform tennis and pickleball courts. Our hope is our gift will spark others' interest in maintaining and preserving Oglebay," said Laurie.

The shelter and upgraded facilities are part of the initial phase of an improvement plan that will include Wheeling Park facilities as well.

Greg went on, "I can't put into words how much we love Oglebay. We are there virtually every single day: walking, playing tennis, skiing, dining. Some of our family's best times and memories have happened here. We feel that giving back is a privilege and we are blessed to be able to do so."

The Oglebay-Wheeling Tennis Association offers tennis clinics, classes and round robins at every level, and hosts USTA sanctioned tournaments for players of all ages and skill levels. Three certified tennis professionals are available for private or group lessons. The outdoor season at Oglebay is just getting started. Maybe tennis can bring generations of your family together too.

THE HILLTOP IS OFTEN a person's first glimpse of Oglebay. Conveniently located off WV State Route 88, this approach maintains many of the original buildings from the Oglebays' time here. These historic places include the: Gate House, stately Oglebay Mansion, Guest House-Casino, Palm Room and Greenhouses, Farm Office and Gardener's Room, and Farm Manager's home. Today these buildings respectively act as: a private residence for park staff; the Oglebay Institute's Mansion Museum; the Oglebay Foundation Offices; Palm Room; Wheeling Park Commission Office of Human Resources; and the main office with the Farm House Sweets and Treats shop on the ground floor.

In addition to these wonderful original buildings, following the level, red-brick pathway, approximately two blocks in total, guests experience the Bissonnette Gardens – which are a re-creation of Mrs. Oglebay's gardens at the turn of the 20th Century, two fountains, the formal gardens and pool, Anna Kuchinka Amphitheater, the Welcome Center, Garden Bistro Restaurant, Bushfield Pergola and the terraced gardens, as well as the Carriage House Glass shop and Oglebay Institute's Glass Museum – home of the Sweeny Punch bowl, one of the largest pieces of cut glass ever made.

The horticulture team plans to return the Palm Room to its original function as a conservatory, the ultimate status symbol from the early 1900s. Leveraging tropical plants such as crotons, bromeliads, lilies and palms, the conservatory will change seasonally with pansies and spring flowers; petunias and summer annuals; chrysanthemums and fall materials; as well as poinsettias and Christmas plantings. A water feature will be reintroduced to this peaceful oasis as well.

The Palm Room and adjacent Greenhouses were designed by Lord & Burnham a greenhouse manufacturer and builders of major public conservatories. They also designed the Phipps Conservatory in Pittsburgh, PA in 1892-3.

Historic photos of the Oglebay Palm Room show towering banana palms, exotic pygmy dates, lush ferns, shrubs and plants. Mrs. Oglebay used the Palm Room and adjacent Greenhouses to grow exotic flowers for arrangements throughout the mansion.

The Palm Room, Greenhouses and the adjacent Welcome Center buildings make up the Aileen Kraft Garden Center. Of course, guests can also take in the best views of the arboretum and enjoy the delicious meals offered in the Garden Bistro Restaurant on the lower level.

Like the conservatory, the plantings on the Hilltop evolve throughout the year. Early spring bulbs include multicolored tulips and cheerful daffodils; lush summer plants include an array of textures and colors from celosia, canna, salvia, begonia, argyranthemum, cleome, bidens, gomphrena, verbena, hanging baskets overflowing with petunia attracting butterflies and humming birds throughout the season; colorful fall chrysanthemums, ending with our annual gardens of light for Festival of Lights each winter. The Hilltop is truly always in bloom.

Dear Eriks Janelsins,

I want to share with you some information that I am very proud of. I recently set up a recurring contribution of \$250 per quarter for the Oglebay tree reclamation project. My father, J. Leland Taylor who passed away at the young age of 57 in 1957, had talked to me on several occasions about planting trees in Oglebay Park when he was a young man. He moved from a farm near Hendrysburg, Ohio upon graduating high school in 1918 at the age of 18. Needing work he took a job planting trees in the park, perhaps with the CCC, I'm not sure. He pointed out some areas in Oglebay where he had planted trees and even some trees that he had planted. Therefore, it was with interest that I saw your pamphlet last summer when I was visiting Wheeling and decided that I wanted to help with your tree replanting...

I am very proud of Oglebay Park. Most people I tell about our park cannot comprehend a small city like Wheeling having such a magnificent park. Keep up your good work and take good care of our park!

MAINTAINING VITAL WINTER RECREATION IN WHEELING


Wheeling Park's Memorial Ice Rink is the only public ice facility in the Upper Ohio Valley.

A major renovation—a rebuilding—of the rink began in March. The underlying five-and-a-half miles of refrigeration piping and the concrete pad are being completely replaced.


The rink is used by 600 Wheeling Amateur Hockey players, 125 Wheeling Skate Club members, six hockey teams from five area schools, and the 20,000+ general skating admissions each year.


Considering the rink's window of operations is 18-weeks from October to March, the rink has the highest attendance of any area of Oglebay and Wheeling Park.



NEW RINK CONFIGURATION Reorienting the ice rink will allow for more bleachers and a much better spectator experience.








