Bloch Memorial Golf Course Dedicated at Wheeling Park

Wheeling Park's 88-year old golf course, the "people's course," was dedicated as the Bloch Memorial Golf Course on May __ through the generosity of businessman/philanthropist Stuart F. Bloch. Establishing a generous endowment gift to provide annual improvements for Wheeling's first public course is a natural way for Stuart to honor and memorialize members of his family for the Blochs have been involved with golf in Wheeling through the generations.

Stuart's great-grandfather, Samual S. Bloch, a co-founder of Bloch Brothers Tobacco, was also a founder of the Wheeling Highlands Course that became Wheeling Country Club. He learned the game from his grandfather, Jesse, and father, Tom (the latter also served as a charter trustee of the E.W. Oglebay Memorial Fund; this fund started with a gift from Sarita Oglebay Russel and it continues to support activities at Oglebay).

Stuart's love for the game led him from caddying at local links to the presidency of both the West Virginia Golf Association and the United State Golf Association (USGA). He also learned to appreciate the benefits of this life-time sport. "A golf course like the one at Wheeling Park can suit a person all of his or her life," he says. "It's both a good course on which to learn and a fine place to continue playing as a senior citizen."

"Stuart Bloch's endowment gift will assure the Wheeling Park course will be well preserved for future generations," states Randy Worls, chairman of The Oglebay Foundation. "Stuart is a visionary, as shown by his civic volunteerism in many areas, and he appreciates those factors that make our community very livable for residents in all stages of their lives."

Doug Dalby, CEO of the Wheeling Park Commission, reinforced that endowment gifts such as Bloch's will assure the continued operation of the historic course and allow user rates to remain as low as possible. "Just as his family enjoyed participating in park activities, Stuart's wish is that all residents can access golf at well-maintained facilities at a reasonable cost," says Dalby.

Bloch Memorial Golf Course Remains as Popular as Year it was Built

Wheeling Park's sporty nine-hole lay-out, now designated as the Bloch Memorial Golf Course, was designed by the late Robert E. "Bob" Biery, the first employee hired by the Wheeling Park Commission (WPC). Park officials did not anticipate a rush to the links, but more than 6,000 rounds were played on the course between its opening on July 1, 1925 and October, when the park closed for the season.

The development of the public courses at Wheeling Park and Oglebay parallels the growth of modern golf in the United States. In 1923, there were less than a million golfers in the country, and most of them belonged to private clubs. By 1930, when the first nine of the Oglebay course opened, there was three times that many, coinciding with and largely due to the popularity of the immortal Bobby Jones.

That the course opened during the first year of operations at Wheeling Park was no small feat. "The ground where the course was built was a jungle," said Biery in a 1991 interview. Biery's crew had to do so much blasting that nearby residents complained to park commissioners. "We blasted the last tree stump at 4:00 a.m. one morning and, luckily, no one heard it," he added. Mule skinners and three-mule teams were hired from Patterson Construction of Pittsburgh, builders of the famous Oakmont Country Club course, to rough-in the greens.

Briery recalled that golfers were so inexperienced that he had to train caddies in technique and etiquette, and then require every golfer to take a caddie onto the course that first year. "That was not much of a hardship," he explained. "Back then you could play nine holes with a caddy for 50 cents.

There were 18,000 rounds played at Wheeling Park in 2012. Several prestigious tournaments, dating back many decades, take place each year. The men's and women's golf clubs sponsor a full calendar of club events and have assisted with the amateur tournaments and contributed funds toward the development of young golfers.

The WPC honored Bob Biery in 1982 by placing a plaque at Speidel's Hamm Clubhouse to acknowledge his involvement with the golf programs at Wheeling Park and Oglebay over a half-century, designating him as "Wheeling's Legend of Golf." If you or your family have an

Eriks Janelsins, former director of the Schrader Environmental Center at Oglebay, has joined the staff of The Oglebay Foundation. Janelsins assumed the position of President in early October 2012. Past leadership positions include serving as chair of the Wheeling ON TRAC Design Committee, and he sits on several national, state-wide and community service organization boards. Janelsins also founded and chairs the WV Environmental Education Association. He is currently a member of the Blue Pencil Club of Wheeling.

"I'm incredibly lucky to begin this phase of my professional life and accept the challenge of working alongside Randy Worls, a visionary leader who has devoted his entire career to developing Oglebay and Wheeling Park," says Janelsins. "I look forward to working with Randy and our loyal donors as we go about the Foundation's mission to keep our parks special for future generations." Eriks credits his parents, both educators, for instilling in him a love of parks, the environment and open space while he was growing up.

Honoring Phil Maxwell - A Personal Memoir By Barbara Palmer, Newsletter Editor

When I heard that Wheeling's Phil Maxwell was being honored at last fall's Oglebayfest, it pleased me immensely. There is no one who has done more to promote and encourage West Virginia artisans than this Wheeling icon who continues to offer his expertise and assistance to the Wheeling Park Commission (WPC) and Oglebay Institute whenever he is asked. The WPC honored him in October by naming the annual Oglebayfest craft show the Phil Maxwell Artists' and Gourmet Markets.

Many of you have known Phil longer than me. A product of Triadelphia High School, he also attended the Penland School of Crafts in the Blue Ridge Mountains of North Carolina. Phil worked as a crafts specialist and teacher (of all mediums) with Oglebay Institute from 1935 until 1986 and then continued part-time until 2009 with just one hiatus; serving in the Air Force during WWII (this is where his love of planes and flying comes from).

Phil Maxwell's many achievements include: being invited by the U.S. Air Force to teach crafts in Europe in the late 1950s; instrumental in founding the Mountain State Arts & Crafts Fair in 1963; induction into the WV Arts & Crafts Hall of Fame in 1996; and organizing the first arts and crafts show at Oglebayfest in 1978. He is a past president of the WV Art & Craft Guild

and provides scholarships for "up and coming" artists and craftsmen at the Oglebayfest show.

I got to know and admire Phil in the 1990s while coordinating craft shows at Oglebay following the opening of Carriage House Glass. As a volunteer, Phil was at my side during all of those events at the Good Zoo,



Wilson Lodge and Site 1. The logistics of producing a craft show are complex, but Phil was always there with a calm demeanor to help with any problems that arose. I know that John Hargleroad and his operations staff also appreciated his expertise and loyalty.

So, I say "thank you my friend" for all you have done for the artisans of West Virginia and for Oglebay Institute and the Wheeling Park Commission. Your involvement has helped make Oglebay a special place. "Phil has been such a booster to artists, crafters and gourmet food producers in our state. The naming of the marketplace, one of Oglebayfest's most popular activities, could not have gone to a more deserving person," says Hargleroad.

were used toward the renovation of Waddington Gardens (now Bissonnette Gardens). In 1999, when Access to the Parks was started, most annual gifts went toward this worthy program unless the otherwise specified. The annual campaign has continued to support Access, now in its 14th year of providing unlimited recreational outings for deserving Ohio County youth.

Oglebay Foundation officials hope to increase the number of annual donors and you can help us accomplish this goal by discussing the benefits of membership to your friends:

- 1. The annual donation may positively affect personal income taxes as a charitable contribution.
- 2. The donation can be made as an unrestricted gift or can be designated for a specific program or facility.

Although annual gifts of any amount from \$25 and up are welcome, a donation of \$500 or more that is designated for Access to the Parks may be eligible for a WV State tax credit (see box). Some Access Donations Eligible for WV State Tax Credit

If you file West Virginia state taxes, your donation of \$500 or more to The Oglebay Foundation for the Access program may be eligible for a 50% tax credit through WV's Neighborhood Investment Program (NIP). Donors will receive a tax credit voucher that attaches, with a program worksheet, to the appropriate form.

Back From Extinction...Dinosaurs Invade the Good Zoo!

Four life-sized, moving and roaring dinosaurs, and one off-spring, arrived at Oglebay's Good Zoo in late March. This unusual exhibit will greet zoo visitors throughout the summer. "The dinosaurs, each fitted with an electric brain, can be discovered in the woods near the Australian Exhibit," says zoo director Penny Miller. "One of the large creatures is non-robotic so kids (of all ages) can sit on it," she adds.

The Good Zoo opened in 1977 through the generosity of Larry and Barbara Good of Wheeling and hundreds of smaller gifts from the community. At first, the zoo consisted primarily of North American animals, but in recent years has

changed its mission to include animals from all over the world. If you or your family belong to Good Zoo Friends (an annual membership), you have unlimited access to Oglebay's zoo and reduced admission for special events. An added incentive includes free or reduced admission at more than 100 other zoos.
